At JAE our learning focus includes Guided Reading & Leveled Literacy Instruction, which are key components of a differentiated literacy approach designed to support all learners. We offer small group instruction to help students improve their reading fluency, comprehension and accuracy. Our grade 1—3 teachers, Support Services Teacher, Education Assistants and volunteers are providing Guided Reading four times per week. Students receive small group instruction based on their reading level. You can support your child by letting them practice reading at home with you!





We also want to extend our appreciation to everyone who joined us for our Halloween Family dance! From the amazing costumes to the fantastic dance moves, your energy and community spirit made the evening truly magical. JAE is situated along the river valley, and the fall colours have provided an incredibly beautiful backdrop for our learning. Our students have been outside engaged in learning on the land. Ms. Caron takes her students for weekly nature walks. Ms. Chypyha and Ms. Kemp investigated trees and collected leaves as part of the grade 1 living and non-living unit. They discussed why leaves change color, why they fall down, parts/ features of plants and their jobs, scars on trees and reasons why. Ms. Wilscheck has also been learning about fall changes, and her class gathered rosehips to make tea with Mrs. Unrau and observed plants under the microscope with Mrs. Atkinson.



Exploring Local Treasures: Sanderson Farms Market & The Grist Mil



Our curious Kindergarteners and K-1s had a wonderful time touring the **apple packing facility** at **Sanderson Farms.** They learned how apples are sorted, packed, and prepared for markets near and far. The children tasted a variety of **locally grown apples** and learned about the many types of fruits and vegetables grown right here in our region. Each child picked out their very own **pumpkin** to take home—perfect for fall decorating! The fun continued at the **Grist Mill**, where students explored a piece of history dating back to **1877**. They saw a **water wheel-powered flour mill** in action and discovered how people used to cook using traditional methods. 


Student Leadership

We're happy to share that our primary literacy program is now up and running. Bench Grade 1/2 students had a great time exploring science and problemsolving as they built boats out of tin foil. They tested whether their boats could float and hold plastic counters, then revised their designs to improve them — such great hands-on learning!

Mr. Denton's, Ms. Kane's, and Ms. Jones's classes also enjoyed a wonderful trip to Central Park for a pumpkin hunt. Nearly 60 pumpkins were hidden around the hills, each with a student's name on it. Students searched high and low to find their pumpkins. There was also a 'Pumpkin Roll" where a few pumpkins were rolled down the hill and students made predictions about how far they would travel.

COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTRE

Over the past few weeks, students have been engaged in a variety of enriching and hands-on learning experiences across multiple subjects. We completed a unit on baking, where students explored different recipes and techniques. Highlights included baking a variety of muffins and a delicious pumpkin spice loaf. This unit not only taught practical kitchen skills but also emphasized teamwork and creativity.

Outdoor Ed has been full of adventure and discovery. After our tea-picking trip was canceled due to the weather, students learned how to play Lahal and listened to some storytelling. We also enjoyed a scenic hike around Kentucky Lake, where we learned about the medicinal uses of various plants along the trail. A special moment occurred when BC Fisheries workers, who happened to be on the trail, gave us an impromptu lesson about the local fish species—an unexpected and informative bonus!

Our visit to Desert Hills was both educational and fun. Students participated in a scavenger hunt focused on identifying different types of fall vegetables. They also conducted a price comparison between farm produce and market prices, gaining insight into food systems and economics.

To celebrate Halloween, students carved pumpkins and took part in trick-or-treating through SCIDES. It was a festive and creative way to wrap up October, bringing joy and community spirit to our school.




