The competition was intense, featuring 10 enthusiastic teams from across the district, all of whom demonstrated a strong commitment to reading and teamwork.

The top-voted title across all teams was *Pony*, a clear favorite among student readers. Through Mrs. Cleaveley's leadership and the collaborative efforts of SD58's librarian team, this event fostered a love of reading and brought students together in a fun, academic challenge that celebrated literacy across the district.











Annual Division 1 & 2 Egg Drop



Division 1 and 2's Annual Egg Drop Challenge continues to be a favorite STEM event that engages students in critical thinking, problem-solving, and hands-on learning. As part of this dynamic challenge, students design, build, and test protective structures to prevent an egg from breaking when dropped from a significant height. Through the process, students apply scientific principles, including Newton's Laws of Motion, potential and kinetic energy, and inertia, while also strengthening their mathematical reasoning and design evaluation skills. The challenge emphasizes collaboration as students work in teams to plan, test, and refine their designs, fostering a growth mindset and encouraging perseverance through trial and error. The event brings a number of classes to come spectate while Mr. Shea drops each design from the school roof. It's a fun, high-energy conclusion that celebrates learning and creativity.









BUTTERFLY AND MOTH REALEASE

This spring, students across the school had the unique opportunity to witness the magic of metamorphosis firsthand through two engaging life cycle projects led by Mrs. Preet and Mrs. Cleaveley . As the school's prep science teacher, Mrs. Preet guided students through the stages of a butterfly's life, from caterpillar to chrysalis to butterfly.

In a similar experience, Mrs. Cleaveley, our school librarian, raised moths in the library, allowing students to observe their transformation up close. Both activities sparked curiosity, deepened understanding of life science concepts, and brought learning to life in a meaningful way.

Because both Mrs. Preet and Mrs. Cleaveley work with all students in the school, these separate projects provided a rich and inclusive learning experience for every child, helping to foster a schoolwide appreciation for the natural world.
