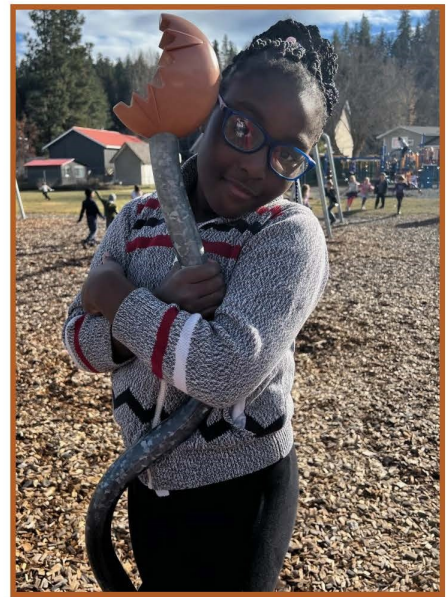

### LUNCH PROGRAM & KITCHEN UPDATE

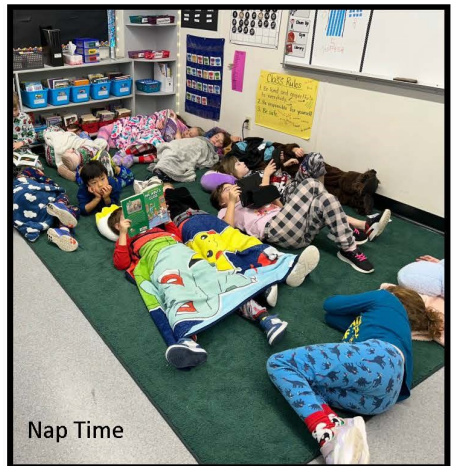

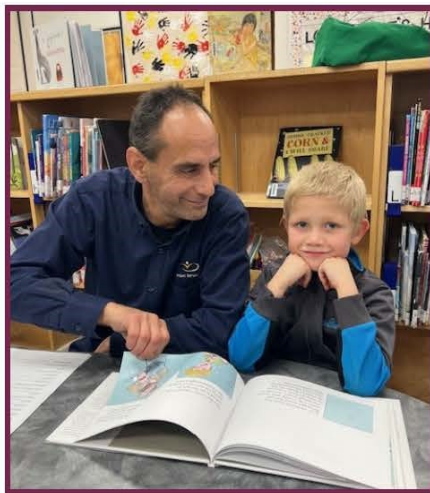

## POST-SECONDARY VISITS



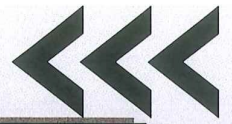

On November 10, our school came together to honour and remember the veterans who sacrificed so much to protect our safety, rights, and freedoms. We are grateful to live in a country where we enjoy the gift of freedom.

Our student-led ceremony began with a powerful entrance: Indigenous student dancers and our colour guard marched into the steady beat of our school drum group, setting a tone of respect and unity. Students and ISA, Martha Chillihtzia, shared greetings and land acknowledgments and *nle?kepmxcin* and *nsyilxcen*, blessings. Leading up to the event, classes learned about the meaning of Remembrance Day and in our annual traditional fashion, created beautiful wreaths to honour veterans and fallen soldiers.

I read *Why We Remember*, a heartfelt book written and illustrated by students from Graysville School in Manitoba. Brave students recited the Act of Remembrance, the Commitment to Remember, and "In Flanders Fields," reminding us why November 11 matters. We also recognized Indigenous Veterans Day (November 8) through a video highlighting the vital roles Indigenous soldiers played in defending our freedoms. The ceremony closed with a moving performance of *Soldier Boy* by our drum group, led by Derrick Sheena, a moment that touched everyone present. This day was a beautiful example of how student voice can lead the way in creating meaningful traditions. As a school, we are proud to honour the past, teach the present, and inspire the future. Lest we forget.

### Space Day in Ms. Morrison's Class

Ms. Morrison turned her Grade 1 classroom into a space adventure! Students walked into a room where desks became rocket ships, planets hung from the ceiling, and constellations lit up the scene.

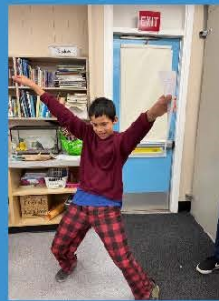


## Mr. Shea Makes French Fashionable

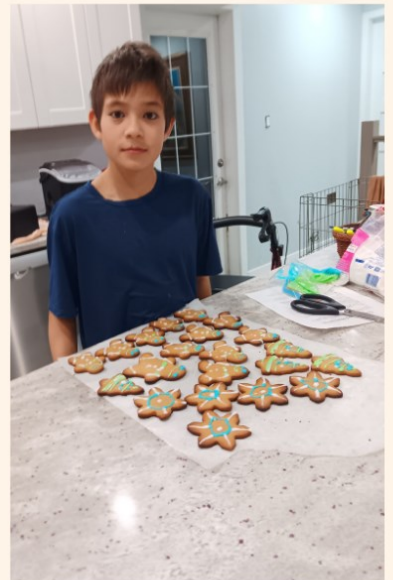

Our school lunch program continues to be very popular, with nearly 40% of students ordering lunch on any given day. This program, along with Backpack Buddies, allows us to support families experiencing food insecurity and strengthen our connection with the broader community.

Our after-school Homework Club is also running well, with 10-12 students attending twice a week. Thanks to grant funding accumulated over the years, and the support of a dedicated teacher and EA, students receive guidance and time to complete work they may not have been able to finish during the school day.
